Keep your themes universal By looking outside yourself for themes to write about, you can overcome the tendency we all have to write about ourselves from a very individual, self-oriented point of view. We assume that other people know us and care about our lives. But, truthfully, if you want to be a successful songwriter, most of your listeners will be complete strangers. They want to hear something they can relate to, feel, and identify with. That's the great power of a popular songs.

There's nothing wrong with writing songs that are very personal. They're important because they express something you want to say. But when you want to reach out to a wider audience, consider choosing a theme and expressing it in a way that many people can relate to.

PFC SONGWRITER CONTEST 2016 RULES

- 1. Entry is free for Peninsula Folk Club Members. All other entries incur a \$10 fee
- 2. The song, both tune and words, must be an original written in the folk genre by the entrant and must have been composed within the last 12 calendar months prior to the Competition date.
 - 3. The songwriter does not have to perform the song written but can nominate another person to perform it on their behalf.
 - 4. The person performing the song can use any acoustic instrument to present the song, the

only exception is that a electric keyboard is allowed, in piano mode only, with no effects or pre-recorded sound.

- 5. A copy of the song's words plus an audio recording of the song (CD, memory stick or MP 3 file) must be forwarded to: The Secretary, Peninsula Folk Club by 15th of May for acceptance. (See notes below)
- 6. All entrants will be advised if they have or have not made the final which will be on Sunday 5th June. Order of performance will be by ballot.
- 7. The Peninsula Folk Club has the right to refuse any entry on the basis that the content is, in the opinion of the committee, unsuitable.
- 8. The Judge's decision is final and no correspondence will be entered into..!!.
- 9. Each shortlisted entrant will need to perform 2 songs on the night of the meeting..the song they are entering in the competition plus one other song of their choice.

NOTES.

- 1. The audio recording does not have to be of professional quality. A home recording done with a computer and free software such as Audacity should give satisfactory results.
 - 2. The recording will be used only in the shortlisting process.
 - 3. If you need any help with the recording, please contact the Secretary. We may be able to advise or assist

Tuesday, 10th May Shane Howard

Shane Howard has refined his art with 13 solo albums, 3 Goanna albums, two books and a stable of great production credits, that have established him as a significant contributor to Australian folklore.

His anthemic song, *Solid Rock*, from the album, *Spirit of Place* (1982), recorded with his band Goanna, was written after a moving experience at an inma at Uluru in 1981. It has since passed into folklore and the Australian psyche.

SOME EXCERPTS FROM A LETTER FROM GIRGARRE

The 2016 Girgarre Moosic Muster has proven to be the most successful muster ever and outstripped all expectations. It was a fabulous event for the Girgarre community, for the at-

tending the festival campers, the general public and the attending children.

After months of careful planning and with the weather gods on our side, the 2016 Muster sprang into action. Volunteers tugged bins, toilets, bbqs and coolrooms, set up gazebos, stages, venues for workshops and registration office, placing relevant signage all over the town as well as purchasing and preparing food for the weekend. Registrations increased by 80% with campers filling the reserve- campers spent up to 5 days in the shade at the Railway Reserve. Saturday is Workshop day with 36 workshops



being held at different venues over Girgarre. Workshop positions increased from last years record 800 to over 1200... Seven concerts were held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday morning and evening with concert goers filling the hall and the park.. Attendances for the evening concerts increased by 100% on last year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Peninsula Folk Club for the wonderful support that you have shown our community over these last 10 amazing years. This year's festival was a huge success and this community is well aware that this success would not have happened without your fantastic support- our two communities have created a very special bond that is unique and quite rare
